

AAUW-IL, Inc. AGENT OF CHANGE AWARD History

The Agent of Change Award was instituted in 1984 by the board of directors of the then Illinois State Division, now AAUW-IL, Inc. The award was to be presented annually to a branch member or American Association of University Women member who had served as a catalyst to bring about positive societal change. The State District Directors are charged with selecting the Awardee from nominations submitted by AAUW-IL branches.

All efforts that relate to AAUW's missions will be considered, with special emphasis placed on activities that relate to current AAUW priorities and initiatives. For example, individuals who have actively promoted change in the areas of education, equity or public policy should be among those considered as nominees for this prestigious award.
