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President's Message

It is nearly spring and that is always a time for renewal, growth, and opportunity. It is also the time to start planning for the **State Convention on May 5 -6 in Peoria**. If you want to renew friendships, grow your knowledge about current events affecting women and our communities, and take advantage of opportunities to meet your colleagues in branches across the state, then you will want to register to attend both days of the convention. Our Program VPs, Becky Glimco and Peg Gallagher, have put together an exciting slate of programs and speakers, who will give you new insights, many ideas for your members and branches, and time to meet with friends old and new. National revised the Bylaws and published them for comment in January. These suggestions and comments have been incorporated into the revised Bylaws that you will begin voting on soon. Please see Andi Danis' article below for details on when the voting begins and how to vote. Your vote is important as these changes will affect each branch and are designed to streamline how branches and the national board operate.

March is Women's History Month and yesterday was Equal Pay Day. Women still earn only 84% of what men earn. So, that requires a woman to work until March 14 to earn an equivalent salary to what a man earns by December the previous year. For our sisters of color the timeframe is even worse. One way to celebrate is to contact your legislators to encourage them to support the **Paycheck Fairness Act**, which was reintroduced into Congress. It is unfair and un-American that women are not paid the same as a man for requisite work. You may also want to work with your local library or college or other organization to support the Start Smart and Work Smart trainings that help women negotiate fairer pay for themselves.

April 4 is the consolidated election across Illinois. This is when you vote for local officials, like mayors and school board and library board members. (Early voting is ongoing across the state.) Given the current assault on schools and libraries about what books and reading materials they include in their catalogs, this election is very important. Remember, we all have a First Amendment Right to choose to read whatever we want. Libraries and schools should provide opportunities for all members of their communities to read books that they choose and to see themselves in those books and materials. Whether you or I personally like a book should not impact the choices made by a library. They are trained to choose materials that are appropriate for various audiences and are qualified to make those decisions. Librarians, teachers, and school and library board members need our support. Be sure to research and vote for those people who support our values and support education and gender equity.

One of the tenets of AAUW is support for **Diversity**, **Equity**, **Inclusion and Belonging**. This means support for all women and girls and protection of those who are part of LGBTQ+ community. There may

We should not be adding to that distress by supporting laws that try to limit their ability to become fully their own person.

These educational leaders from middle America are well prepared to discuss how the trends we are seeing in the media are playing out for teachers and students. You will hear of their leadership journeys, including what helped them along the path and what could have helped them. In addition, they will reflect on our AAUW research, such as college debt and women successes in engineering and computing, as they discuss educating women and girls.
- **Changemakers Panel** moderator: Dr. Jennifer Robin, Professor of Management & Leadership, Bradley University; Panelists: Representative Nabeela Syed, IL State Representative IL-51; Crystal Owens, AAUW StemED Ambassador. Our moderator, an expert in leadership development and gender studies will provide guidance for us on leadership skills. Dr. Robin will also help to showcase each of the panelists who is a leader committed to bringing about change, sharing their efforts to take creative actions to address social issues.
- Affinity group session Know that we heard you last year. Post convention surveys indicated that convention participants want time to gather with members from other branches who have a similar role or interest. AAUW-IL board members will help to facilitate the session.

Be aware of candidates that are attempting to destroy public education by banning books, refusing to encourage genders of all children and adults and white washing our racial history are pretending to be 'normal'. Please work with others in your communities to check out the goals of every one of your candidates!

The statewide coalition will have endorsed candidates soon. As we learn who they are, we will contact public policy chairs and let you know. We appreciate all of the work that you all have done to protect AAUW values in our public school and library districts.

As was noted in the January 2023 *Connection*, the National election is coming up! You will be asked to vote on significant changes to the AAUW Bylaws and the yearly changes recommended to the Public Policy Priorities.

Some of the Bylaws changes being proposed include:

- Revising the wording describing AAUW's charitable purpose to align with large NFP verbiage and appeal to a broader range of corporate sponsors.
- Eliminating the requirement for 60 days' notice before board approval of a dues change.
- Having board officers elected by the board, not the membership.
- Eliminating any reference to conventions when discussing meetings of the membership.

What National has done in their complete review of the Bylaws is to update their procedures and language and streamline their operations. The changes they have made are consistent with the way that most large NFPs govern and conduct business. Having thoroughly reviewed these proposed changes, and finding nothing alarming or inconsistent with best practice, the AAUW-IL, Inc. Board voted unanimously to recommend passage of these proposed changes in the upcoming election.

If passed, some of these changes will result in mandates for State and Branch bylaws. I will be sure
