Morton Branch AAUW: Our GEMS have STEAM! (Why and how we started a STEM education program for girls)

In 2014, the public policy officer for our branch repeatedly reported on the underrepresentation of women in STEM fields (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math). The conclusion of most of these reports was two-fold: young women were missing out on careers with opportunities for high salaries and long-term growth potential; and the world at large was missing out on contributions of almost half of the population.

Many of our members are educators and we discussed how this situation begins in elementary schools in our own community. We agreed that was an area where our branch could make a difference.
