The veto session for the Illinois Legislature is scheduled to take place on November 12-14 and November 19-21. The veto session is usually held for six days in the fall and was designed to allow the General Assembly to take action on bills that the governor has vetoed. In present times, the session is also used to address pending legislation. This past year there were no pieces of legislation that were vetoed by the governor so the legislature will be addressing only pending legislation. Our lobbyist will meet with me and Ken after the session has ended to brief us on any actions that are relevant to our AAUW public policy priorities. The results of the recent election at the federal level and its impact on our state is sure to be weighing heavily on the minds of the legislators in the Illinois General Assembly. Stay tuned for updates next month and use every opportunity available to contact your legislators and let them know you support AAUW values.
