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Public Policy Update

We all enjoy seeing Spring return and look forward to the fresh rebirth that it brings. We hope and need to work together to ensure that rebirth also occurs in the world of politics. AAUW at the local, state and national level is seeking to make that happen as we strive to fulfill the AAUW Mission: "Advancing gender equity through research, education and advocacy" and our policy goals. While most of the funding for our schools comes from local taxes, the State and Federal Government plays important roles as well.

As a reminder of a few of the things they do, within the Department of Education the Office of Federal Student Aid funds higher education aid programs like Pell Grants. Elementary and secondary school spending is used to fund Title I, special education programs, and school improvement programs. The Institute of Education Sciences (IES), which is the smallest division of the Department of Education, funds education research and teaching effectiveness in the US. It also collects and analyzes education data through the National Center for Education Statistics, a sub-agency of IES. You can learn more at the links.

A recap of recent action reported in the news; on March 11, the Trump administration fired nearly half of the Education Department's roughly 4,100 employees, leaving the agency with a skeletal staff of about 2,183. Now the scope and impact of those layoffs are beginning to take shape. Lawyers who worked on regulatory, legislative and education programs in the department's general counsel's office are expected to be terminated alongside policy staff and technical workers in special education and information technology offices.

Other cuts targeted the department's elementary and secondary education office, as well as the agency's office for English language acquisition for immigrant students. The firings are the first step toward the administration's goal of fully shutting down the department, officials said, though such a move would require congressional approval.

We have also been invited and encouraged as individual members to raise our voices with letters to Congress through the "Two-Minute Activist." If you haven't acted already, the currently active advocacy letters are available at the link. Please be sure to join with members from across the nation in signing these and future letters

At the state level things are quieter as the legislature is beginning their work. We are currently meeting with coalition partners and reviewing proposed legislation, using the AAUW policy priorities as a guide, to identify legislation to support or oppose. As initial action in this session, the following RESOLUTIONS supported by AAUW have been adopted

- HR115 STOP-IMMIGRATION ACTION
- HR116 CONDEMNS-SPENDING FREEZE
- HR117 CONDEMNS-TARGETING DEI
- HR119 STOP-TARIFF PLANS

As we move forward, we encourage you to vote in the upcoming local elections for candidates who support AAUW priorities, watch for and respond to witness slip relative to legislation being acted on in Illinois and join with members from across the nation signing and sharing letters available through the "Two-Minute Activist." 

Save Our Night Skies April 2, 2025, 6:45 PM


